

Closing the Coverage Gap and Georgia's Economy

Closing the coverage gap would significantly boost the state's economy, spurring new jobs, increasing income, and strengthening the middle class.



Spurs job growth

- More than 51,000 new jobs statewide
- Most new jobs (57 percent) support workers outside of health care in fields such as construction, retail trade, administrative and support services, and restaurant services



Puts more money in the pockets of average Georgians

- Nearly **\$900 average increase** per household in personal income
- \$3.6 billion increase in personal income statewide



Brings economic benefits to the whole state, including rural areas

- Rural Georgians receive as much as one-sixth of the total economic benefits
- This includes more than **5,600 new jobs**, more than \$475 million in additional personal income, and more than 4,200 annual population gain



Grows our economy

 Increases state's economic output by \$9.4 billion and our GDP by \$5.5 billion in the first three years




A win-win
